#### **OBJECTIVES**

Equinet's perspective on LGBTI people (<a href="http://goo.gl/epaCsc">http://goo.gl/epaCsc</a>) as well as other sources (such as the work of FRA) show that LGBTI people suffer serious discrimination in daily life. Equality bodies can be key actors of change in improving their situation.

This Equinet training strives to provide equality body staff members with a space for **peer learning** and for **discussing key challenges as well as good practices** in the field.

It is expected that participants will:

- Learn about the most current issues, recent achievements and new developments in securing equality for LGBTI people
- Share their knowledge and experience both formally during the sessions and informally in breaks
- Learn about good practice initiatives and projects by other equality bodies
- Return to their jobs better equipped to promote and secure equality for LGBTI people
- Upon their return **inform** their colleagues in their equality bodies about the lessons learned at the training

#### **PARTICIPANTS**

This Equinet training is dedicated to an audience of approximately 50 staff members of equality bodies with responsibilities in dealing with LGBTI issues. The training programme allows for participation with different professional backgrounds, including legal, policy and communication experts.

#### **KEY THEMES**

The Equinet perspective on LGBTI people identifies key themes for equality bodies. These topics will be addressed at the training.

- Societal-political-legal context for the work of equality bodies
- Strategic approach to work on LGBTI issues
- Under-reporting of discrimination by LGBTI people
- Specific actions addressing LGBTI issues including influencing policies and law, promoting good practice by employers and service providers, research and casework
- Internal challenges for and processes of equality bodies including capacity, coherence, engagement and sustaining a focus.
