The FRA VAW survey

- 28 EU Member States
- 1,500 interviews per Member State
- In total, interviews with 42,000 women





How the survey was carried out

- Random sample of women aged 18-74 years old
- All interviews face-to-face
- Each interview between 25 mins to over 2 hours
- A standardised questionnaire for all countries
- Female interviewers with specialised training
- 2 years to develop the survey + 1 year for fieldwork



What the survey asked


- Physical and sexual violence by partners & nonpartners
- Psychological violence by partners
- Stalking and sexual harassment including cyber
- Fear of victimisation and its impact
- Awareness of law & support services
- Violence in different settings & by different perpetrators
- Experiences since age 15 & in last 12 months
- Experience of violence before age 15 by an adult

Overall prevalence of physical & sexual violence

An illustration of what women said about their experiences



- 1 in 3 women has experienced physical and/or sexual violence (at least once since she was 15)
- > 8 % of women in the last 12 months
- 22% of women have experienced physical or sexual violence by a partner
- 11% of women have experienced some form of sexual violence
- 5% of women have been raped
- 1 in 2 women has been sexually harassed
- > As many as 1 in 5 women in the last 12 months
- Context: Gender Equality Directive 2006/54/EC (recast)

Sexual harassment questions in the survey: 11 items (of which 6 focused on)


- Unwelcome touching, hugging or kissing?*
- Sexually suggestive comments or jokes that made you feel offended?*
- 3. Somebody sending or showing you sexually explicit pictures, photos or gifts that made you feel offended?* ■
- 4. Somebody indecently exposing themselves to you?*
- 5. Somebody made you watch or look at pornographic material against your wishes?*
- 6. Unwanted sexually explicit emails or SMS messages that offended you?*

- Inappropriate advances that offended you on social networking websites such as Facebook, or in internet chat rooms?
- Inappropriate invitations to go out on dates?
- Intrusive questions about your private life that made you feel offended?
 - Intrusive comments about your physical appearance that made you feel offended?
- Inappropriate staring or leering that made you feel intimidated?




Prevalence of sexual harassment (%)

- Overall rate of sexual harassment with 11 items






Forms of sexual harassment, since the age of 15 (%)





Sexual cyberharassment by age group (%)








Sexual cyberharassment since the age of 15






Sexual harassment among women with tertiary education, since the age of 15 (%)






Perpetrators – most serious incident of sexual harassment (%)






Psychological consequences of the most serious incident of sexual harassment (%)

Sexual harassment FRA Opinions

- Employers' organisations and trade unions should further promote awareness of sexual harasssment and encourage women to report incidents
- Role of Equality Bodies?
- EU Member States need to review existing legislation and policy responses to sexual harassment, recognising that it can occur in various settings and can use different mediums – such as the internet
- Role of Equality Bodies?



Sexual harassment FRA Opinions

- Recognition needs to be given to the fact that <u>professional women are at risk of sexual</u> <u>harassment, as are other women</u>. Awareness raising and practical initiatives by employers and other organisations should address this reality.
- Role of Equality Bodies?
- Administrative data and existing <u>surveys</u> on work and education should be enhanced to include <u>regular and detailed questions on sexual</u> <u>harassment</u> – so that the data can be used to inform policy and action.




Awareness of law

- Every second woman in the EU is aware of existing legislation in their Member State concerning protection from and/or prevention of domestic violence
- BUT half of women either state that there is no specific legislation about domestic violence in their country or that they do not know if there is
- Great variation between Member States often reflecting the reality concerning existence of targeted legislation

Why data is essential for developing and monitoring efforts to combat violence against women



Generic follow-up points

- Ratification of the Istanbul Convention
- Implementation of the EU Victims' Directive, in particular with regard to the needs of victims of GBV; implementation of Gender Equality Directive (recast)
- Commission strategy on equality between women & men needs a comprehensive response to address all forms of violence against women
- Targeted prevention and awareness raising for young women
- Men need to be positively involved in efforts to combat and address violence against women



Generic follow-up points

- Need to measure impact on the ground
- Effectiveness of legislation, policy initiatives and practitioner interventions can be judged by the evidence on the ground – namely, are women reporting abuse and are they satisfied with the services they receive (including from Equality Bodies)
- Need for harmonised information collection & exchange – with appropriate safeguards
- Women can contact several services need for joined-up response
- Interventions relying on one institution/database may miss patterns of abuse



Generic follow-up points

- Specific data on violence against women (or GBV) is currently not available in most Member States
- Comprehensive and detailed data is needed for the development & monitoring of policies to combat violence against women
- Working groups at EU level have been established to look at enhanced data collection in areas such as sex trafficking – good practice
- Equivalent working groups are needed on specific forms of violence against women – such as sexual harassment? – the scale of which is often significantly higher


