

DEFINITION OF HATE SPEECH APPLIED IN STUDY

Hate speech is stigmatizing, derogatory, offensive, harassing and threatening statements that are directed at an individual or a group based on the individual's or the group's gender, ethnicity, religion, disability, sexual orientation, age, political beliefs or social status.

### METHOD AND DATA

- ✓ Quantitative content analysis
- ✓ Danish Broadcasting Agency and Danish TV2
- ✓ 3000 comments from 1700 posts
- ✓ Data collected minimum 12 hours after publishing
- ✓ Survey among Danish Facebook users

### **HOW MUCH HATRED?**





Every 7th comment is hateful.

### TOPICS WHERE THE DEBATE IS MOST HATEFUL









Figure 35: 511 respondents who participate in debates on Facebook. Question: "Please indicate whether you agree or disagree with the following statement: The tone in a debate on Facebook keeps me from participating in the debate"

#### DO THE MEDIA HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY?



**Three out of four** Facebook-users believe that the media has a responsibility to ensure a civil debate and delete derogatory and offensive comments.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- News media ensure transparent content moderation and clear guidelines
- The Danish Media Liability Act is revised
- Preparation of national action plan on hate speech

### **DIHR PRIORITIES**

- Legal analysis on media liability and new data
- Dialogue with news media
- Dialogue with decision makers
