



# Tackling age discrimination: Stepping Up our Engagement with Youth 1-2 March 2021

# CONCEPT NOTE & DRAFT AGENDA FOR ONLINE WORKSHOP In Cooperation with the European Youth Forum

#### **BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT**

The <u>EU Youth Strategy 2019-2027</u> calls for special attention to be given to those risking marginalisation based on potential sources of discrimination and strives to contribute to the eradication of all forms of discrimination of youth. Young people experience inequality, individual and structural discrimination on the ground of their age, as well as multiple discrimination based on other personal characteristics such as gender, race and ethnicity, socio-economic status, sexual orientation, religion or belief, and disability. Despite the barriers faced by young people in accessing their rights, EU equality legislation does not adequately cover age-based and multiple discrimination. Equality bodies are mandated to assist victims of discrimination and raise awareness of rights. However, the capacity of equality bodies to assist youth victims of discrimination and to raise awareness of rights is often limited by their mandates, under-reporting and lack of casework, and absence of data<sup>1</sup>.

The work of youth organisations is crucial to raise awareness of rights amongst young people, empower them to recognise and stand up against discrimination and address the relevant institutions to seek legal or other appropriate remedies. Equally, by reason of their various competences and expertise, equality bodies play a central role in promoting equality and in fighting discrimination experienced by young people in many fields.

Previous Equinet research<sup>2</sup> in the area suggests that links between equality bodies and young people should be strengthened. This would help **equality bodies to better understand what equality in practice means to young people, involve young people and their organisations** in developing and sharing good practices, as well as raising awareness of rights under equal treatment legislation with initiatives specifically designed for young people. Providing young people with a better understanding of equality and the tools available to them to tackle the discrimination they face is also crucial to for them to advocate for their rights are protected, respected and fulfilled.

In 2018, a <u>seminar organised by Equinet together with the European Youth Forum (YFJ)</u> produced a <u>list</u> <u>of actions</u> that can be taken to **establish stronger collaboration between equality bodies and young**

**people**. Next to Legal Actions (Litigation) and Policy Making, Communication remains a main area where more cooperation is needed. This workshop acts as a follow-up to that seminar, providing a space for equality bodies and youth organisations to continue to strengthen their cooperation. Additionally, this workshop will feed into **finalising the Handbook on Stepping up Engagement with Youth** currently being drafted by Equinet's Working Group on Communication.

## **OBJECTIVES OF THE WORKSHOP**

This online event will bring together youth civil society representatives and equality bodies to identify best ways to cooperate around our common goal of furthering equality in society. Ultimately, we aim to **build links between youth organisations and national equality bodies to fight discrimination together.** 

In particular, the workshop will bring together national equality bodies and youth organisations to:

- Explore ways to strengthen collaboration, especially on communication, in order to better promote equality and tackle age-based and multiple discrimination both on and offline;
- Discuss the communication work of equality bodies, focusing on opportunities and obstacles related to inequality of and discrimination against young people;
- Identify best practices for improved promotion of equality.

The workshop conclusions will help to finalise Equinet's upcoming Handbook on Stepping up our Engagement with Youth.
